



WELCOME TO WINCHESTER CATHEDRAL

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Advent is a season of expectation and preparation, as the Church prepares to celebrate the coming (adventus) of Christ in his incarnation. This service begins this Cathedral's annual celebration of these great mysteries.

In the northern hemisphere, the Advent season falls at the darkest time of the year, and the natural symbols of darkness and light are powerfully at work throughout. This service is a movement from darkness to light, mirroring the journey of the human race from the darkness of sorrow and death into the light of Christ's dawning Kingdom.

The service begins in darkness as the Choir sings the Advent Prose. As the great Advent Antiphons and words of scripture proclaim the coming of a new King of Love, that light spreads gradually eastward until the Cathedral is ablaze with the light and hope of Christ's promised dawn.

This central theme of the Advent service is reinforced by the words of the Advent Antiphons, each calling Christ to return by one of his prophetic titles 'O wisdom, O root of Jesse, O Key of David - come!'. The first letters of each antiphon's title for Christ in Latin, when reversed, form the Latin phrase: ERO CRAS, which stands as a reminder of the Christian hope. 'Tomorrow I will be there.'

May the God of peace make you completely holy, ready for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Now when forty years had passed, an angel appeared to Moses in the wilderness of Mount Sinai, in the flame of a burning bush. When Moses saw it, he was amazed at the sight; and as he approached to look, there came the voice of the Lord: "I am the God of your ancestors, the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob." Moses began to tremble and did not dare to look. Then the Lord said to him, "Take off the sandals from your feet, for the place where you are standing is holy ground. I have surely seen the mistreatment of my people who are in Egypt and have heard their groaning, and I have come down to rescue them. Come now, I will send you to Egypt."
